

The Gentrification of Upper New York City



The Bronx, Harlem, and Washington Heights are a part of upper New York City known for its POC communities and overflowing, powerful culture that can leave a stunning impression on anyone. A rapid wave of Hispanics and African Americans rushed into the Bronx when many European nationalities moved out in the 1940s. Since then, the Bronx has been cherished for its origins of hip-hop and rap music and exploring the art of graffiti. Harlem, a main puzzle piece in African-American history, became the home to many African Americans during the Great Migration. United, they embraced their heritage in music, literature, fashion, politics, and more. Today, every area in Harlem has its own distinct ambiance, with lively greenery and delicious food. After the assassination of the dictator Robert Trujillo, the Dominican Republic lost its political and social stability. Large numbers of Dominicans fled to Washington Heights, creating their own "Little Dominican Republic". Now, there is a bodega on every street, a variety of items lined up on tables on sidewalks, Spanish-language schools, and Hispanic restaurants. You may question: "How does this relate to current events today?" Gentrification is a common issue in major cities where wealthy newcomers settle, and new costly projects, and renovations are introduced in poor areas. In New York City, gentrification is nothing new, but the current effect is alarming displaced residents, who are packing their belongings to move somewhere more affordable.



From there, we traveled to North America. Here we opened this region with a look into deaf culture and a song interpretation from the senior ASL class. They were able to really give the crowd a look into the beauty of ASL. Along with performances following the ASL interpretation. The Dance Company highlighted the core of New York culture with their Hip Hop dance. They performed the song "Empire State of Mind" by Jay Z and Alicia Keys. They gave each girl on the stage their spotlight with small solos embedded into the routine. Of course, The Step Team performed and they did a phenomenal job, as always. Right before the marvelous performance of the step team, there was a poem recited about heritage. Through this poem, it was clear that heritage is something everyone must cherish and care for no matter the circumstance of which they live in. Overall, this portion of the show really displayed the rich and dynamic culture of our home, New York City.



From the US, we traveled south into Mexico and the Caribbean. The Dance Company opened this portion of the show with a sensual Bachata to show the heavy Latin influence at Cathedral. Bachata is a form of music that can be heard all the way from the coast of Peru to the island of Puerto Rico. Therefore, although it may originate in the Dominican Republic, bachata represents more than just one country, but collectively symbolizes all hispanic countries in the Americas. Next from Central America we zoomed into Mexico. Girls ranging from 10th to 12th grade danced Cumbia. Cumbia is originally from Colombia but has a large popularity amongst the Mexican people. Cumbia is a form of dance that you will see at any Mexican birthday party, and you saw it on stage at Cathedral. Of course, you'll also see dances like salsa. Angelique Campos, co-captain of The Dance Company, brought Puerto Rico to Cathedral High School with a beautiful Salsa solo dance in gorgeous attire.





Salsa is also popular in South American countries. South America has a rich and lively culture, just like North America. A continent full of diversity in every aspect. Rosa Olan sang a beautiful song in Spanish to showcase the beauty of the language. In a way, she prepared the crowd for the fascinating Chilean Native dance by Victoria Torres. Victoria put on a beautiful performance in her native Chilean attire. The dance she brought to the stage shows that native roots are still alive throughout the modernization of society. Not only were the native roots brought on to stage but also the African roots of Brazil. The Dance Company, once again, put on an engaging performance of traditional Brazilian Samba. They were dressed in the colors of the flag with every grade of Cathedral High School on that stage.

Gentrification is a highly controversial debate because of its advantages and disadvantages. Opinions on the topic depend on the socioeconomic factors surrounding the individual. The most common form of gentrification in the Bronx is the placing of expensive housing, which can cause a surge in rent costs around the area. This may cause some low-income residents to have to find other places to live, and in the worse case, become homeless. One common defense for gentrification is that it promotes economic growth, but economic development shouldn't necessitate displacing residents. There have reportedly been occurrences in East Harlem, despite it not being as gentrified as West and Central Harlem. For instance, when landlords use sneaky schemes to evict long-term tenants, they could ignore requests for room repairs, not supply hot water, or create a more costly environment. From 2010 to 2020, Harlem lost about 10,805 Black residents and it has been long since the neighborhood lost its majority of Black residents. Washington Heights used to be an affordable choice of living, but many residents have noticed the change throughout the years. The small businesses that make up Washington Heights' way of life ultimately fall prey to gentrification. This is how gentrification can directly impact a resident's quality of life. A chain of stress and pressure is formed among them, which can cause mental health issues in the future. These residents are now experiencing the consequences of gentrification and are no longer watching in silence as their neighborhood or borough is a victim of profit. Residents who have remained in the same place for decades are now protesting to protect the culture that took them years to build.

America's True Legacy

Did the Declaration of Independence's concept of equality truly encompass *all* men and women in America's early years? Thus, the 'beginning' of America was *not* on July 4, 1776, but rather, among its people who fought to preserve their very right to exist.

Ida B. Wells was an African American journalist who dedicated her life to the unjust conditions African Americans and women were facing during the 1890s. She was born on July 16, 1862 - just three years before the end of the Civil War. Despite the said freedom of African Americans, they were still subjected to horrific lynchings (led by white mobs) without being accused of any crime, resulting in the loss of millions of innocents. Wells was exposed to the grief and loss after three of her friends were lynched, accused of opening a grocery store too close to their white competitors. This demonstrates the absurdity and inhumane circumstances they were exposed to by white people. Despite these conditions, Wells became the first African American editor and co-owner of a newspaper in the US. There, she directed her attention towards the lynchings and proving the innocence of the men who were almost always accused of rape without any evidence.



Just as there is Native and African origins of these countries, there are also European ones and we go back to Brazil's origin, Portugal. Anita Andrade recited a Portuguese poem to the audience. The words were smooth and rich just like the culture. Portugal, along with France, have had a huge impact on the world today. France has an alluring and romantic language that has swept over many countries. Marina Ramackers-Vasquez delivered a French poem in which she showcases the intimate language that 235 Million people use to communicate. Rosa Olan, once again, sang a beautiful song from Germany. This song embodied the purpose of the show, that no matter where you are from, you can appreciate the charm of all countries. We also saw the appreciation of culture with the Irish dance by Alyssa Rivera and Mairin Welker. These girls brought something that you possibly have never seen before, the presentation of Irish Dance. Although they're the first ones to do it, they will be the ones who have done it best. It was a pleasant moment when they began but as they preceded it became more and more engaging.



As we travel from West to South and East we go into Asia. In the segment of the show, the Philippines and India were on the stage and they performed beautifully. Alessandra Alejandro sang a song, which was truly delightful to hear. Alessandra sang a song in Tagalog that had the crowd swaying from left to right. To spotlight more Filipino culture, Jhudiel Gersano and Victoria Torres performed a traditional dance. They danced Tinikling, which is a folk dance with bamboo sticks. It was almost as if their feet and the sticks put together a beautiful song along with the instruments of the music.

Lynchings were often glorified and used as a source of public amusement. Wells wrote two pamphlets, A Red Record: Lynchings in the United States, and Southern Horrors: Lynch Law In All Its Phases to expose its barbaric and animalistic nature; in response, the white mobs threatened and even burnt the offices of her newspaper down, forcing her to flee to New York City. Despite this, Wells continued the fight against segregation, lynching, and the Jim Crow Laws, as a founding member of an interest group known as the NAACP, or the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Apart from her efforts towards securing rights for African Americans, Wells also fought for women's rights by co-founding the National Association of Colored Women, where she worked with other women's activists such as Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. Wells believed there was a correlation between women's suffrage and racial inequality, and she used her platform to advocate for both causes simultaneously.

Despite the systemic discrimination and hostility towards African Americans, Wells was able to maintain her integrity and resolve as a journalist by continuing to defy societal expectations that had limited her because she was a woman. Ida Wells paved an example for future journalists to follow, by recognizing the abuse of power and by fighting to fix it for the sake of others. She remains an inspiration in the fight for equality that continues today, as her hope for a better future lives on.

The Easter Holiday



For generations, Christians and Catholics have celebrated the Easter holiday - one of the most important celebrations of the liturgical year. Not only does this festival bring people together, it also gives them a chance to share traditions with one another, while also carrying on their religious convictions to future generations.

What is Easter, exactly? Easter is a Christian celebration that commemorates Jesus Christ's resurrection. Easter changes from March to April and doesn't have a set date, as it typically depends on the moon; the celebration takes place on the first Sunday following the Paschal Full Moon, which is the first full moon following the vernal equinox. Following Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, Easter Sunday signifies the conclusion of Lent. People gather to feast, go to church, and hunt for Easter eggs as part of the Easter celebration. Many cultures celebrate Easter in different ways - Ethiopian Orthodox Christians, for instance, observe a fifty-five-day fasting period before Easter during which they only have one meal per day in the late afternoon or evening, they refrain from consuming any animal products, and follow a completely vegan diet.

Easter was a pagan festival in the Northern Hemisphere that celebrated the arrival of spring even before Christianity existed. In fact, many feast days in the new Christian Church have their origins in Greco-Roman paganism. The pagan goddess "Eostre" is where the term "Easter" comes from, and the paganism of the holiday is also reflected in the colors of Easter: which are green, yellow, and purple. Hares with eggs are emblems of fertility and new life. As Christianity evolved, Easter inevitably became linked to Christ's


2. The Record - boygenius



A Talk With... Ms. Colon

In the Cathedralite Press' last, but certainly not least, issue we had the privilege of interviewing Mrs. Colon—the health teacher for juniors and seniors and the Director of the Medical Gateways Academy. Throughout this interview, she gave us a glimpse into her world of teaching, organizing, and faithfully leading our Medical Gateways students to success!

Then, time to delve into some questions!

1

Q1: Please provide us with a brief timeline and summarization of the work you have done here at Cathedral from the very beginning to present day.

"I've been here for about eight years now. When I first started at Cathedral, I only taught Introduction to Health, so just freshmen. Then, after three or four years, I moved up to become the Director of the Medical Gateways program. Now, I teach the juniors and seniors— which I love. We have gotten many partnerships since I have become Director; we have partnerships with a lot more hospitals. Now we have partnerships with hospitals in Westchester, Queens, The Bronx. We just started interning with NYU last year and The Hospital for Special Surgery this year."

Q2: As a teacher of a mandatory freshman class that is not a common core subject such as math, english, or history, how did you find a way to engage students in a way that compels them to want to continue an education in the health sciences at Cathedral?

"I personally think that because it is not one of the major subjects that are required, there is more of an interest in it for them. They are more interested in the topics because it involves the things they're worried about like diet, exercise, reproductive systems, and communicable diseases—especially after going through a pandemic. So I think the students are interested in the curriculum of the subject area and therefore they want to more than they have to."

Q3: Health and medicine are career paths that many students at Cathedral are passionate about pursuing, and they often begin this part of their career journey in your class. What qualities do your students acquire or utilize in your class that are necessary for a medical professional to have?

"As far as introduction to health, students learn the basics there. For sophomores, they get a feel for the different careers they have the option to pursue in the future— even if they did not initially have an interest in the career, in the class they may learn something that sparks an interest for them. For juniors, now that they have an understanding of what each career is associated with, now they go through each body system and the diseases and disorders that are associated with each. So, that gives them a better experience while they are in the hospitals one day a week getting the hands-on experience. Lastly, in senior year, students learn about all of the health issues occurring globally: just like the pandemic, which was a large topic for the seniors last year."

Q4: Which lesson that you have taught throughout the years do you believe your students will always remember long after they have finished taking your introduction to health class?

"There are definitely many, but the subjects that I've seen students be most interested in and have the most questions about is the reproductive system. Since we are all women, it is easier for me to talk to them about it. They're just interested in the topic area: being a woman and learning about the best ways to take care of yourself as a woman."

Q5: Over the years, you have developed and successfully implemented the Medical Gateways internship program currently available to junior Medical Gateways students. What are some of the most impactful experiences you have witnessed come from this program?

"The most impactful experiences include a lot of students who were in the program and loved their internship are either in medical school or are a doctor now. Many of our guest speakers that come back for the white coat ceremony are students who have graduated that are pursuing a career in

medicine. So Medical Gateways is not something they do and forget about, they definitely are taking this with them in their college years and are making something out of it."

Q6: One of the many things your students love most about your presence at Cathedral is your iconic fashion sense. What are some of your staple work pieces that you cannot live without?

"Black dress pants and a basic, light-colored top; you can always switch it up with a blazer or different colored shoes and different accessories!"

Q7: For senior Medical Gateways students, the white coat ceremony is the consummation of all their hard work throughout their four years. What do you look forward to most within that event?

"I enjoy the planning of it because it's something that's mine; I wait for this because I know all you girls are interested in the Medical Gateway Program and you view it as such a big accomplishment because this is your senior year you get to go out there and say 'I've done this.'; For me it's such an accomplishment and it makes me very excited to be able to present something like that to you and your parents that will honor all of the hard work that you girls did."

Q8: What aspect of health education was most appealing to you when you first decided to pursue it?

"I'd have to say the most interesting aspect of health is communicable diseases and it's honestly one that I love teaching, especially because I feel like there are a lot of questions in 'why, how, & what' so the students are just as interested as me. They are definitely more interested in the topic now than before the pandemic; they want to know how you can get a virus, how you can get a bacterial infection, how you can cure them, what isn't curable, what medicines to use, and what can I do to avoid being sick. That aspect really made me love health even more, especially after that event that affected us worldwide."

Q9: "Through the relationships you have established over the years, you have made so many opportunities available to students in the Medical Gateways Academy. In your experience, how did you manage to network with so many people, and what advice would you give students for creating such connections in the future?"

"Honestly, reaching out. I tell my students all the time: reach out to everyone, talk to everyone, make connections everywhere. It's the best possible way to just get your foot in the door. For me, going to different events or dinners you meet new people all the time and I'm constantly bringing up my students and what they could use in order to better their education or experiment-wise, environment-wise, internship opportunities, anything. Whatever it is, I definitely want a better experience for my students so I'm always networking. Sometimes I'll find an email and I'll just send a message, sometimes they'll get back to me, sometimes they won't, but I'll always reach out and try."

Q10: "In the past, if you had been interested in pursuing a different career, what field would you have worked in and why? (If she was interested in working in healthcare, ask what field she would prefer.)"

"If I could change my timeline I probably would've become a gynecologist. It sparks more of an interest for me now that I talk about the female reproductive system all the time. In another lifetime, though, I'd definitely do something in the fashion industry. Fashion week has been calling my name for years."

Q11: "Which topics are some of your favorite to teach and which ones are your least favorite? Is there a topic that you feel would be the most important for your students to take away from your class?"


"The most important topics for my students to take away are my lessons on nutrition and exercise and self-care, mentally and physically. My favorites are the reproductive systems & communicable diseases but I also do really enjoy talking about all the body systems with the juniors and I can't even pick a favorite because they're all so important and you can't really live without having all of them."

Q12: "In general, what advice would you give your current students for navigating the remainder of their high school years? If you were to give advice or information to underclassmen interested in joining the Medical Gateways Academy, what would you suggest?"

"So for the students that are interested in joining, I would suggest making sure that your grades are always up-to-par, making sure you're ready to take on a big responsibility, being able to communicate with people outside of Cathedral, making sure that you're on time, you're accountable for your actions and that you can make it to school every day. To my current students, I would say to keep the positive attitude, keep your connections always in good standing, continue to be you and follow your dreams, don't let anybody stand in your way, and, my favorite, always dance like no one's watching!

To no one's surprise, Ms. Colon has shown us that throughout her years here at Cathedral High School, she has given us medical gateways students much more than just white coats. Under her guidance, Cathedralites obtain extensive health education and wisdom that will inform their career decisions within the medical field for years to come. Q1: Please introduce yourselves and your respective contributions to Cathedral throughout the years (clubs, sports, leadership positions, etc)

For my Senior year, I decided to remain focused within the clubs I joined my junior year."

Q2: [For the both] What aspect of your friendship do you believe allows you to work best together? What made you decide to run together for student council?

Danielle: "For me, I think it's just how Grace and I practically are on the same wavelength. We're able to communicate and just bounce ideas off each other without it ever getting chaotic.
